MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

It has been a busy and productive month. Council has been working on these strategic tourism projects for well over a decade, and I thank all who over this time have contributed to making our District diverse and sustainable for future generations.

We must however not forget our core role in infrastructure management, and I am so pleased that Council will soon be delivering a very comprehensive asset management plan.

FISHING BAN

Together with the Mayor of Port Pirie, we met with Minister David Basham in relation to the fishing ban. Council is cognisant of the impacts this ban places on our coastal communities, and we appreciate the great support from the Port Pirie Regional Council in addressing this matter. The State Government have been very open with Council, and have included impacted Councils to participate in longer term solutions. We will keep advocating on this matter to get the best outcome for all, and one that is safe and sustainable.

THE BLUFF LOOKOUT

On Friday 17 September The Bluff Lookout was officially opened by Mayor Phillip Heaslip, the Hon David Speirs MP (Minister for Environment & Water) and the Member for Grey Rowan Ramsey MP.

For many years the Wirrabara and surrounding communities had longed for the moment when this fabulous destination would be able to be safely accessed. Having been struck by disaster by the Bangor fires in 2014, The Bluff Lookout gives stimulus and growth back to the immediate area. The Bluff Lookout is a unique tourism based project that allows members of the public to travel to the top of the Southern Flinders in the Wirrabara Forest area by road and view one of the most awe-inspiring views of the region from a purpose built viewing platform.

With the assistance of the Federal and State Government's, Council was able to complete this project which complements the \$10M development of the Southern Flinders Ranges Precinct. Offering an additional remarkable attraction for visitors who come to utilise the new trails and facilities, The Bluff Lookout enhances visitation and showcases the best of the Southern Flinders.

The welcome to country from Nukunu elder Lindsay Thomas and speeches from Mayor Heaslip, Member for Grey Rowan Ramsey MP and Ministers Speirs and Member for Stuart the Hon Dan van Holst Pellekaan MP were witnessed by DCMR Council Members, community representatives, neighbouring council Mayors and CEOs, Member for Frome the Hon Geoff Brock MP and members of the Legislative Council the Hon John Dawkins and the Hon Justin Hanson.

Numerous staff from the Department of Environment & Water, PIRSA, Yorke & Mid North Tourism, Regional Development Australia, National Parks & Wildlife and Landscapes Board were also in attendance.

PORT GERMEIN JETTY

Council has had several meetings with the Department of Infrastructure & Transport (DIT) concerning the long term future and current repairs to the Port Germein Jetty.

Council, in partnership with DIT, is preparing a business case for the upgrade of the jetty and envisages that the business case will be completed by the end of 2021.

DIT officers are extremely confident that the repairs to the jetty will be funded and that works will start in 2022.

THE WHEELS ON THE BUS!

The District Council of Mount Remarkable has a new set of wheels. With Council earlier keen to explore options for upgrading the existing community bus, Council undertook a process for new options. The purchase of a brand new bus was a little more than expected (some \$180k). However, Mayor Heaslip through his travels as part of his ongoing professional development to increase his local governance knowledge and skills through an existing relationship with the Mayor of Burnside, became aware that the Burnside Council was looking to sell two of their community buses. After some negotiating and discussions, Burnside Council CEO agreed to dispose of the disability access community bus to Mount

Remarkable directly at an agreed price of \$45,000. Whilst not brand new, the new Toyota Coaster is newer, lower in kms and provides additional comfort than the previous community bus. To celebrate, Mount Remarkable has added its own personal touch, so when you see it out and about give the bus a toot and a wave!

WASTE STRATEGY – DELIVERY OF GREEN WASTE BINS

Council's waste contractor Clare Valley Waste has now commenced the rollout of green waste bins. The rollout has commenced on the western side of the District at Weeroona Island and then Port Germein, and progressively over the next two weeks the rollout will run through other townships. Further updates and an updated waste collection calendar will be provided in due course.

Green waste bins are for garden waste only. Items that you can put in your green waste bin are flowers, herbs, plants, leaves, weeds, grass clippings and prunings (less than 100mm in diameter and 800mm in length).

SHARING OUR ROADS WITH HEAVY VEHICLES DURING HARVEST

There's no greater reminder that the District Council of Mount Remarkable is abundant in agricultural product with lots of trucks rolling down the highways and Council roads piled with grains.

October has arrived and with it the soon the commencement of the district's harvest season.

We are informing locals and visitors to the district to be well aware that the start of the harvest season is nearly upon us and care must be taken on roads.

Everyone - not just people that live in the Council region - should know that for the next few months there will be a significant increase in heavy vehicle traffic on most minor roads and highways. Often the trucks and harvest machinery will be moving in and out of paddocks directly onto the minor roads and this is when extra care needs to be taken.

The main message is clearly road safety. There are a few important things to remember about sharing the road with heavy vehicles that include:

- » staying out of the truck driver's blind spots
- » keeping a safe distance not only to allow the truck a reasonable stopping distance, but also to avoid debris from the trailers and wheels
- » allowing trucks sufficient room to negotiate turns
- » how to safely overtake a heavy vehicle

BUSHFIRE PREPARATION -YOUR HOME AND PROPERTY

Keeping your home and property well prepared throughout the year is essential to ensure you survive a bushfire. A well prepared home is more likely to survive a bushfire than one that hasn't been prepared.

A well prepared home:

- » can be easier for you or firefighters to defend
- » is more likely to survive, even if you're not there
- » is less likely to put your neighbours' homes at risk
- » will give you more protection if a fire threatens suddenly and you cannot leave and have to take shelter

Ways to protect your home:

- » Use non-flammable building materials
- » Starve the fire by clearing vegetation and rubbish away from your home
- » Create a defendable space by carefully managing trees close to your home and reducing vegetation for 20 metres
- » Fill the gaps where embers might enter or catch
- » Protect your assets with adequate home and contents insurance

Even if you plan to leave early, there is a greater chance that your home will survive if you have undertaken preparations.

SPARK PROOF THE HOUSE AND BUILDINGS

To protect your house it is vital that you prevent sparks and burning material from entering through windows, under doors and/ or under floor boards. You can do this by:

- » Fitting metal fly wire mesh or solid screens to spark proof the windows, doors, ventilators and skylights.
- » Close in all openings in eaves and under-floor areas.
- » Sealing all gaps in the roof area along the ridge cap, gutter line and fascia board.
- » Extending wall cladding on buildings and sheds to the ground.
- » Sealing the flute spaces at the fascia board with fibreglass insulation or scribed flat metal with corrugated iron roofs.
- » Tiled roofs need an appropriate fire rated insulation (sarking) immediately below the tiles.

ROOFING

Most homes ignite when sparks or burning embers blow under tiles and start burning roofing timbers or accumulated litter. Metal roofing offers more protection provided it is firmly secured and sealed around vents, skylights, fascias and roof caps.

UNDERFLOOR

Underfloor areas that are not enclosed allow sparks and embers to penetrate. If these areas are used to store timber, firewood, or other flammable materials, the risk is increased. Make sure that underfloor areas are kept clear of flammable material during summer.

WINDOWS AND VENTS

Crevices where embers can collect are potential ignition points. Cracks under doors, on window ledges, windows, or along verandas are particularly vulnerable. Vents into the house structure are also common entry points for sparks. They should be covered in fine wire mesh to prevent embers from getting into walls, roof cavity areas or through windows.

IN THE GARDEN

Reducing the amount of vegetation on a property is one of the most critical components of preparing for bushfires.

Before the fire season you can:

- » Remove dead branches, leaves and undergrowth from around your home especially under trees.
- » Prune tree limbs that are lower than two metres above the ground or overhanging your home.
- » Reduce, remove and manage vegetation such as long grass within 20 metres of your home and within 5 metres of any sheds and garages.
- » Remove bark, heavy mulch, wood piles and any other flammable materials close to your home and sheds.

Other things you can do include:

- » Installing a sprinkler system to wet down your home and garden to reduce the affect of radiant heat, sparks and embers. All fittings should be metal, as plastic melts.
- » Ensuring access to an independent water supply such as a tank, dam or swimming pool of at least 5000 litres. Do not rely on mains water being available during a fire.
- » Installing a petrol/diesel-driven water pump.
- » Making sure hoses are long enough to reach around your home.
- » Using a stone wall, earth barrier, or fence close to your home as a radiant heat shield.
- » Planting lower flammability vegetation, including plants and trees with low oil and high water and salt content.
- » Developing a well-managed vegetable garden, as it can act as an excellent fuel break.
- » Planting trees and shrubs with space between them so they do not form a continuous canopy.



BUSHFIRE PREPARATION - YOUR HOME AND PROPERTY

Smooth surfaces

Paint or refurbish dried exterior timber, repair nooks or crannies where leaves and debris can gather. Design pathways, driveways and lawns around your home to keep a clear area immediately around your home.

B Roofing Well-secured metal roofing is preferable. A tiled roof needs to

be well fitted with fire-resistant sarking (fibreglass-based aluminium foil).

Walls Choose non-flammable wall materials such as brick, mud

brick and fibre cement. Vinyl

weatherboards, rough timber

and other cladding can warp or


catch fire. Gaps in external roof

and wall cladding need to be

sealed.

Windows, crevices and vents

Spark-proof your home with bronze or stainless steel flywire screens on windows and doors, or install fire resistant metal shutters. Cover all wall cavities in fine wire mesh. Enclose areas under decks and floors. Screen vents in the roof space with fine wire mesh.



COUNCILLORS

Spri A home bushfire sprinkler system that directs water over the roof, windows, doors and underfloor areas is one of the most effective ways of protecting against radiant heat, direct flame and ember attack. Seek professional advice for design and installation.

 $\square S$ Install wire-reinforced glass or a

thermo plastic cover on skylights as plastic can melt and glass can break in intense heat.

Gateways should be at least 3 metres wide and there should be clear access with a

Gutters

Regularly clean gutters and remove leaves and bark from any areas where they can become trapped.

IN SPRING GET READY FOR THE IMPENDING FIRE DANGER SEASON

- » Slash or mow long grass and remove cut material (unless it can rot down before summer).
- » Remove weeds.
- » Cut back trees overhanging your home.
- » Remove fallen branches and other debris.
- » Remove leaves from gutters.
- » Check and service all mechanical equipment, including grass cutters, water pumps, sprinkler systems and fire extinguishers.
- » Prepare / check your emergency kit.
- » Review, update and practise your Bushfire Survival Plan.

DURING SUMMER MAINTAIN YOUR PREPAREDNESS THROUGH THE FIRE DANGER SEASON

- » Maintain defendable space of up to 20m around your home (greater if on a slope) and 5 metres from sheds and garages.
- » Clear around trees.
- » Remove leaves from gutters.
- » Slash stubble near sheds and buildings (following regulations for Total Fire Ban Days).
- » Check reserve water supplies.
- » Practise your Bushfire Survival Plan with your family.
- » Ensure you have a portable batterypowered radio and spare batteries to listen to bushfire warnings.
- » Monitor Fire Danger Ratings.
